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
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Where we have been....

By an act of Congress, in 1887, certain lands were set aside in various states and territories for the establishment and maintenance of homes for Union veteran soldiers. In North Dakota the state Veterans Home was established in 1891 and has been in operation since 1893.

The original barracks building was built of Menominee brick at a cost of \$18,000. It was finished in native wood with maple



When the Home first opened dispensary type of medical care was available, with a local physician making sick call each morning. Two practical nurses were employed; one was on night duty and the other serviced at intervals during the day.

In the year **1899**, a hospital building was erected, at an approximate cost of \$16,000. In the late 1940s the hospital was closed and the building became the civilian employee quarters.



In 1907, a building was constructed to serve as the Commandant's residence, at an approximate cost of \$9,000.

Original Barracks



Since the Home was self-supported in the early days, much of the labor was performed by the residents working with the farming operations, laundry, kitchen, garden, and keeping quarters clean. As the age of the group became older, this labor was not available due to physical disabilities, and civilian employees were hired.

Through the years, the barracks building deteriorated and was in such a state of disrepair that it would have taken thousands of dollars to repair, and further, the membership was increasing to a point where additional room was necessary. A bill was introduced at the Thirtieth Session of the Legislative Assembly providing

for erection of a new barracks building, and was approved on March 14, 1947. This building was constructed at an approximate cost of \$600,000 and was completed and formally dedicated on **June 7, 1950**; by Governor Fred G. Aandahl. The building was designed to accommodate 150 veterans, spouses, and widows. It was modern in every detail and an automatic elevator places the entire four-story building on one floor.

The old barracks building was demolished during the summer of 1952; the entrance of this building is marked by a Civil War cannon. The hospital building, which is no longer standing, was converted into a residence for the civilian employees, and housed a \$20,000 laundry in the basement.





A 1.7 million dollar construction and remodeling project was completed in **1980.** With its completion, the facility conformed to all state and federal regulations on life safety and handicapped accessibility, increased its capacity to 159, provided new laundry facilities, and expanded its crafts area considerably.

July 1, 1983 the Administrative Committee on Veterans Affairs changed the name of the Soldiers Home to 'North Dakota Veterans Home'. It was felt that the new name adequately reflected the clientele the Veterans' Home served.

The 1990's brought about many changes to the North Dakota Veterans Home. A 3.6 million project converted 17 basic care beds to skilled beds, added 21 new beds, a new kitchen and dining room, updated laundry services, central air conditioning, parking space and new road ways.

The 150-bed domiciliary changed capacity to 112 for veterans and spouses as well as the domiciliary care changing to Basic Care.





A four-season room "Gazebo" was added to the 38-bed nursing home (skilled unit) in 2000. It provided the needed room for activities and a place for families to gather with their loved ones. The funds for the "Gazebo" were provided by donations and the Post War Trust Fund.



Where we are....

On February 27, 2009, the North Dakota Legislature passed Senate Bill # 2025, which made it possible to build a new facility for the Veterans of North Dakota. In May 2011, we moved into our new state of the art Veterans Home.

Gone are the white walls and sterile feeling of the past. We are now a HOME. Our culture at the North Dakota Veterans Home encourages residents to make their household their home. The home focuses on individual households designed for 12-13 residents. Each household centers around a large living room area, open kitchen and dining area. Each household looks and feels like a home, with few medical signposts. The new home has two basic care pods that can house 98 residents and one skilled care pod that can house 52 residents. Each pod has four households connected together by a hallway that leads to the center core of the building. The center core is designed with a main street theme where residents can visit the bank, library, barber shop, pool hall, museum, town hall, movie theater and chapel. The new Veterans Home utilizes green technology through the use of a geothermal system with 738 wells that heat and cool the entire building.

One of the greatest parts about the household concept is how each home has its own personality, like any other home in the community does. All you have to do is take a tour to see how some of the homes vary. For example, some households are a bit lively and like to visit and eat around one big table together, while others are more subdued and private. There are households that enjoy working on puzzles and planting

flowers and vegetables in the outdoor raised flower beds. If you walk into a neighboring house you may find residents watching "I Love Lucy" while enjoying their afternoon snack. All of these differences create a HOME for the Veterans and spouses of Veterans that reside at the North Dakota Veterans Home.



Where we are going....



From the Desk of Mark Johnson, Administrator

This might come as a shock to many of you, but I celebrated my ten year anniversary at the Veterans Home this summer. What a great place! I am so blessed to be surrounded by so many talented individuals. The staff of

the Veterans Home have accomplished so much over that time. They all need to take credit for making the Veterans Home one of the best in the country. We have a cutting edge facility with residents that tell us how happy they are every day. Over the last five years we have been a five star rated facility, which is the highest rating you can get. It is a huge accomplishment for our staff. But I want you all to all know that accomplishment means nothing when it comes to why we are really here. Our mission and purpose is to care for American Heroes (our residents) and I'm so proud to say that's what we do. I can go on, but let's talk shop.

Over the last few months a great deal of time has been spent on making the workshop/studio a reality. The project was bid in the spring, but due to cost overruns we have had to scale back our project. We tried not to cut interior square footage, however, we ended up changing the exterior siding and some of the interior finishes. One of the biggest reasons for the cut was due to the increased cost for masonry work. Therefore, we decided to change the workshop/studio area to look like an old gas station from the outside. Inside we cut back on the finishes by doing polish concrete floors with butcher block counter tops. I'm actually really excited to see the finished product; I think it will be pretty neat when everything gets done. Our main delay was due to the Life Safety review which was done by the Health Department; it delayed our project almost 2 ½ months. Construction commenced the 2nd week of October 2016 and we hope to have everything completed by the end of June 2017. I can't wait to show off the new addition next summer. The workshop/studio will be an incredible addition to the Veterans Home.

They try to make as many Veterans homes and VA hospitals as they can in a year. We had them last fall and again today. The Re Creation comes because they reach into the past (today from the 1940's), bring the song in, but re-create it into a more modern venue. Very interesting. They are sponsored by the Bowling

And for about the first time I can remember since I came, I heard the Field Artillery song sung as I knew it from my military days (The Army decided that was their song, and changed several of the words in a few phrases to take it away from the artillery). Anyway, it was a delightful afternoon that helped re-create the soul as well. Just an example of the delightful, and thoughtful things we get here at our

on Sunday. This Huge bus came in at ly the full 1 1/2 hours we were ear-7:30, and we loaded up. There were about 30 of us, plus about 10 staff, I think. About half of us were wheel chair I think. They just loaded those wheel chairs into the cargo area under us, and we were off. When I tried to sit down, I almost got off the bus. There was not room for me to sit up straight -- my knees hit the seat ahead of me. But ... there were

so many seats in that bus that I simply took a double seat all to myself, and sat sideways in them. That gave me a good view out the other side and plenty of leg room. The sun was bright, beautiful day across the state. It was so much fun looking at things from that higher altitude, I'd say about 3 cars high.

We left with a motor cycle escort --

a vets cycle group - 6 bikes. At Bismarck we picked up 2 more that had passed us somewhere around Crystal Springs, and were waiting when we made our dinner stop at Bismarck. Another 10 at Dickinson -- 18 Bikes escorting us -that's the way we went -- thru Medora and right up to a parking spot near the Pitchfork Fondue (wonder how you spell that?) Just 1 1/2 hours early for our evening dinner date. "We'll go make arrangements. If you need to go to the bathroom, its right over there, Otherwise stay near the bus." BOOM -- That really loud crack of thunder was so close that it almost beat the flash of

light," Nope -- don't any of you go out". And the storm hit -- wow, Well, we went to Medora as planned what a storm -- it beat at us for nearly. But then it quit -- and the sky to the west was bright and clearing. Now we could go for our dinner. Well, no -- the staff had been talking, and knowing how hard it was to unload and load us in that wet, they had basically decided we would go home. We could eat a special dinner at Bismarck, and then journey on home. I objected. So we



took a vote -- about 5 for staying -that didn't quite carry, so we hit out. I knew we would overtake that storm before we got to Dickinson. When we got to Medora the town was flooded. Cars were driving slowly along the streets just like the pictures you so often see. The Badlands colors are always so beautiful after a rain, and this was no exception. We were near Fryburg when we caught up with the storm. And it battered hard all the way to Mandan. I really had to admire those drivers for their ability to drive in that storm. The staff had called ahead to some good restau-

rants on the south side of Bismarck, so the driver took the express way around South Bismarck. I had been hoping the staff would think again. We certainly weren't going to get unloaded, have dinner, and get loaded again before the storm hit us again. Sure enough, about the time we crossed back over the river, the staff spoke again and told us that very thing. We would stop at McDonalds, those of us who could walk, could get up and go in if we wished, but bring your meal right

> back out to the bus. For the rest, the staff would take orders and deliver out to us. Good. About 6 of us went in and ordered. But before we could even order, the storm caught up to us. We ate our meal inside and at a lull, hit for the bus. We got a little wet going out, the staff got good and wet delivering meals. So the journey home. I figured we'd run out of the storm again near

Jamestown -- and we did run out of most of the heavy rain shortly after we turned south on highway 32. But the thunder and lightning was really heavy -- and close, often, all the way home. We arrived home about 1:30 AM. I was in bed about 1:45, and had a good morning's sleep. It had indeed been an interesting trip. We didn't see the musical, or have a big dinner like was planned, but you know, I'd go again. And my admiration for those 2 drivers, and even more, that staff that babied us thru the whole thing. Ah.. Yes -- I'm glad I live here. We'll have more fun rides along the way. The home is good --God's even greater.



Several of the NDVH residents have served in these organizations and are proud of what an impact their organizations make on the lives of those living at the North Dakota Veterans Home. We thought it would be fun to highlight some residents as they share their experience in service organizations.









Leo Feltman, Member of the AMVETS, VFW and American Legion



Leo Feltman did not hesitate a bit when we asked him for an interview regarding his involvement in Veteran Service Organizations. First off-Leo is a veteran of the Marines who served in WWII. When asked which service organizations he is a member of Leo surprised us by mentioning four organizations-VFW Post #9367 of Grafton, AMVETS #11 of Grafton, American Legion Unit #41 of Grafton and the International Allied Veterans.

Leo recalls joining the VFW and Legion in the 1950's, the International Allied Veterans (IAV) in the 1970's and the American Legion in the 1980's or 1990's.

When asked why he joined Leo shared that other Veterans asked him to, specifically mentioning a man named Phil.

Leo let out a good chuckle when asked if he held any offices in the VFW, stating, "about all offices in the post," which included Post Commander and Post Quarter Master for 41 years. Leo was also District Commander three times in District #8. When Leo left Grafton in 2011 to move to his new home in Lisbon he held the office of Commander of the AMVETS in Grafton which he still holds today, although he shares

they will be closing soon. In the American Legion Leo did not hold any offices. In the International Allied Veterans Leo served as a Commander for one term.

When asked what activities and outreach his organizations promoted, Leo shared a lot about the VFW in Graton. Dances and bingos were held in the Grafton VFW which also had four apartments in its building. Leo shares that "every dollar that the club had came from bingo." Ardyce, Leo's wife, served in the VFW Auxiliary and Leo shared that she cooked many meals in the VFW Hall for banquets and special meals, including meals on Veterans Day and Memorial Day. In addition to cooking meals for the club Ardyce served as a bookkeeper for the auxiliary. Leo spent much time participating in parades and drill squad for funerals with fellow VFW members.

A highlight for Leo was <u>and is</u> attending yearly conventions for the VFW and International Allied Veterans. In fact Leo recently returned from the International Allied Veterans convention in Devils Lake with his good friend, BJ Brazil.

Elaine Qual, Member of the American Legion Auxiliary

For over forty years **Elaine Qual** has been a member of the Florence Kimball American Legion Auxiliary Unit #7 of Lisbon.

In the 1970's the local American Legion and Auxiliary was sponsoring area boys to attend Boys State and one of Elaine's sons was chosen. Encouraged by American Legion Auxiliary members, as well as a neighbor/member whom Elaine drove to meetings, Elaine joined. Elaine became a member through her husband, however he never attended a meeting as he was "100% farmer," to add to that he was a dairy farmer.

Elaine held office of Auxiliary President every other year for a while. While in this role there were roughly 20 active members. Meetings took place once a month in the American Legion Building. The Legion and Auxiliary hosted a Memorial Day event every other year which included a parade, ceremonies at the bridge and cemetery, and a lunch was also served. This tradition continues today. Another tradition that continues is the sponsorship program for Girls State. Elaine and Auxiliary Member, Betty Tuffty, are co-sponsors of this program and Betty interviews young women interested in attending this event.

Money was not easy to come by so the Auxiliary members did a lot of things hands on, such as preparing meals for Auxiliary State members when their meetings were scheduled locally in Lisbon. Rummage sales were held to raise funds as well. Elaine's face brightened up when she started talking about Poppies and she shared that "we sold a lot of poppies." Elaine shares that when it was poppy season her unit would wait in the dining room of the old Veterans Home and sell Poppies to residents as they came down for their meals. The Unit also sold poppies all over Lisbon. When the Legion Post started selling tickets for gambling they would also give some of the profit to the Auxiliary which helped increased their funds.

For roughly five or six years Elaine also held the office as chairman for the state. While in this role, Elaine and fellow members would sponsor

a bingo at the North Dakota Veterans Home. Elaine explains that the bingo was much different than the ones she attends now as a resident of NDVH. The State Auxiliary members would bring prizes instead of money. Prizes included, T-shirts, sweatshirts, socks, bananas, etc. Residents who bingoed would then choose their prize which led to some lengthy bingo games. During the time Elaine was chairman, the Auxiliary also held the American Legion Auxiliary Christmas Shop. Elaine had fun sharing how that has changed and developed throughout the years. In Elaine's day the shop was held in the museum (in the old building) and residents would take their turns shopping as it was a small space. At that time residents were able to pick a gift for a family member and the Auxiliary would package it and mail it. In recent years the Gift Shop takes place in Town Hall and the residents are allowed to pick gifts for two family members, as well as one for themselves.

Conventions created fun memories. As Elaine recalls, Minot, Bismarck, and Fargo were some of the cities she attended conventions at. When asked what her favorite memory was, Elaine shared it was when she first joined and the "old Ladies that were members were so happy to have younger ones join." She also liked the stories that the "old ladies" shared about "partying" at the conventions. Elaine found that both surprising and fun. Elaine said she has been part of several organizations over the years, however the American Legion Auxiliary has been her favorite organization to be part of. Elaine adds that being a member did not require a lot of time.

Lee Schmidt, Member of the DAV and American Legion

Air Force Veteran **LeRoy "Lee" Schmidt** is a member of the Disabled American Veterans-Regan McLean Chapter #5 of Devils Lake. Lee joined the DAV in the 1980's and has been a lifetime member since 2003. Lee is also a member of the American Legion Post #41 of Grafton, although not an active member, he continues to pay his dues.

When asked why he joined the DAV, Lee shared that he was at the Fargo VAMC for appointments and met with a DAV Service Officer in Room 206 of

the Fargo VA Regional office. The Service Officer was able to increase his service connected disability rating. One of the Service Officers that assisted him was Greg Sauer. Lee shared that he has worked with four Service Officers over the years.

Lee spent many years working in Iron Works as a Foreman and was not able to be active in his local DAV chapter until retirement. When Lee did become active he became **ACTIVE**, selling \$1200 worth of poppies in the first three days of the poppy drive. Lee is not afraid to ask people for donations and that is exactly what he did by visiting local banking branches and businesses seeking donations for the poppies fund.

As a post, the members would often gather at the White House Cafe in Devils Lake on Saturday mornings. Once a month meetings took place in the DAV office which was a rented space that the chapter rented for \$200 a month including electricity. After two years in the office space, membership was down and the members approached the landlord about the situation. The Landlord graciously offered them the space, rent free for 6 years. As of today the meeting space is closed and the DAV records are in Nelson County according to Lee.

On several occasions the DAV Chapter assisted financially to help individuals pay for taxi rides. The chapter also assisted people as they started a new job by assisting with some of their living expenses. Lee shared that they simply tried to help anybody that needed it. Most recently the chapter donated an American Flag to the North Dakota Veterans Home MIA/POW memorial.

The DAV mobile Unit comes to the North Dakota Veterans Home yearly and Lee is always the first one to greet them. Lee assists the DAV Service Officer with setting up and he



makes sure fellow residents are aware of the services offered by the mobile unit. Lee is a promoter of the DAV and does his best to assist Veterans in knowing what is available to them through the help of the DAV.

Lee would like readers to know that he has had good treatment at the Fargo VAMC. Lee is easy to get to know and has developed relationships with staff at the Fargo VAMC.

Thank you Lee for your dedication to fellow Veterans and to continually seeking ways to better things.
