

Connie was the type of person you would never forget. The type of person who makes a mark on your life even if you had a brief encounter with them at a gas station or restaurant. My first encounters with Connie were via phone as she inquired about living at the Veterans

Over the course of her stay at the Veterans Home Connie became a tour guide, spokesperson and contributor to our newsletter, "The Scuttlebutt." In May of 2014, Connie accompanied me to the AMVETS convention in Fargo. Connie shared about being a Marine, being a wife of a Marine, and her life at the Veterans Home. Once again Connie shared her story, telling Legion Members how much she enjoyed living with her brothers in Victory House at the North Dakota Veterans Home. services. Wayne has also faithfully served as Basic Care Resident Council President, a role in which he encourages other residents to contribute and participate in their community. If you have been on a tour of the Veterans Home, you have likely run into Wayne as he loves to meet possible new residents and share his experience with them. Wayne has also given many tours of the home to visitors.



Lee Schmidt is an Air Force veteran who served in Korea. If you are a member of the DAV there is a good chance that you know Lee. Lee was very active in the Devils Lake DAV chapter and continues to be while he is a resident in Lisbon. If something needs to be done, Lee is your man. Lee made table organizers for the Peace Garden household,

which allows residents easier access to the condiments. Lee lives in the Peace Garden household where he advocates for fellow residents and keeps them up to date with the activity calendar. Last year Lee saw that several of the residents struggle with poor vision. Along with the inspiration and idea from activities staff Noreen Fahsholz, Lee started a project. Corks, metal washers, magnets, a hot glue gun, and large font

bingo cards equals a renewed fun for bingo. Residents, who in the past needed assistance in Bingo, are now able to play on their own thanks to the adaptive device Lee constructed.





Gayle Gill is an Army veteran who served in the Vietnam era. Gayle offers a sense of security at the North Dakota Veterans Home, as he makes sure everything is in its place. While a resident, Gayle has worked in various positions including, dietary, transportation, night watchman and currently, activities. Gayle goes about his work quietly, and

there is never a question that Gayle will do what is needed. Gayle anticipates schedule changes in the activity calendar, and ensures all is in place. Gayle is kind and respectful to all staff and residents, and is much appreciated.



Larry Hertwig is an Army veteran of the Vietnam era, and our resident artist. Residents and staff look forward to Larry's holiday letter as it displays one of his beautiful sketches on the cover.

Recently at the National Guard Christmas Party, Larry sketched a Christmas card for General Sprynczynatyk and his wife Connie. Bingo and poker, and has been an active Resident Council Member in the past. Larry is always willing to help out and is friendly to all.





Larry Clifton has been a resident here for a few months; but, he fits in well, likes it here, and is well-liked. Larry hails from Ober, North Dakota which is near Devils Lake. His military duties began in 1966 when he was drafted into the Army. After training in Ft. Lewis and in Virginia, he was a heavy-wheel mechanic in Vietnam. He also saw action there with the Peterson Outfit, during part of a "burning out" process.

After that duty and a return to the states, he felt that he no longer fit into this country. Because of his own personal struggles with returning home, Larry's current passion is encouraging Veterans to utilize the services of Veteran Service Organizations. He attributes the assistance of the Disabled Veterans of Americas for his current resi-

dency at NDVH.

These days, if you are looking for Larry you will no doubt find him with his nose in a book—specifically a western. He is working at remembering names as he fits effortlessly into his new life by Connie Zangla here.

John Farmer is a dedicated career man who served his country for 21 years in the United States Air Force. His many duties both stateside and overseas included flying supplies to both Korea and later Vietnam where he was exposed to Agent Orange, the source of his Parkinson's and short-term memory loss. After John's retirement, he joined the Patriot Guard Riders who ride motorcycles and carry flags to funerals of fallen soldiers as well as welcome home those returning from duty. However, this was during a tumultuous time when anti-Vietnam demonstrators gathered to call the returning veterans, "Baby Killers", thus; the Patriot Guard was disbanded in hopes of allowing grieving families to bury their heroes in peace. Later when John came to the ND Veterans Home he once again took up his flag and attends each funeral with the honor due to each Veteran. He is our faithful Honor Guard. I'm sure you join in saluting John for his dedicated service.




What is Re-Creation-USA?

The purpose of the founding was to bring a group of people together that could meet & share their interests in all types of cars. This continues to be the foundation of the club but has expanded to help meet the needs of organizations and charities of North Dakota and Minnesota by donating portions of the proceeds to them.

Over the years, the membership was upped from 15 members to 20. Over the years over 300 people have been Toppers members. The Trademark of the Toppers is and always has been, the black jacket with the white top hat and white lettering. The Clubs first car show was in 1957 in downtown Fargo. In 1960 the Show moved to the Fargo Civic and was then moved to its current location at the West Fargo Veteran Memorial Building. Each year the show has been getting bigger and better, trying to showcase some of the best vehicles in the area.






























What is a Veteran? A Veteran whether ac-

ty to coordinate the event, which has taken place for more than 20 years thanks to the volunteer efforts and personal donations of the Guard members.








